



**The Dog Sled**

Used almost exclusively in the Yukon and Kuskokwim River Valleys, on the Seward Peninsula, and in Northern Alaska, the dog team transports mail and serves as a general freight and passenger carrier.

The sled ranges in length from five to sixteen feet, depending upon its use, and the average Alaska dog team comprises from five to nine huskies.





## SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Entering Juneau high school in 1934, the Senior class boasted sixty members. After spending a moderately active three years, the class emerged in 1937-38 with the largest graduating class in the history of Juneau high school (forty-six) and with one of the most active classes in school.

Five senior boys, Henry Behrends, Gilbert DeVault, Bud Brown, Ed Hildre, and Harold Hensen, were on the varsity basketball squad. The Girls' Rifle club was for senior girls only and had a membership of eleven, while ten of the graduating class were members of the Boys' Rifle club. Gerald Coke served as president of the Debate club. The Mummers club claimed ten seniors and the business and editorial staffs, eleven. Ann Campbell, Ruth Kunnas, Mary Jean McNaughton, and Harold Hansen were the senior Torch Society representatives. Nine graduates were included in the Science club, and five were members of the Photo club. Quill and Scroll, the organization for high school journalists, for the most part was made of seniors, having nine in that group. The J club, Librarians, Glee clubs, Band and Orchestra, and Girls' and Boys' Intramural sports also had their share of seniors.

Senior class representatives in the school plays were Mitchell Daniloff, Violet Mello, Marguerite Protzman, Mary Jean McNaughton, Elaine Housel, Lyman Snow, Tom Hellan, Robert Ridley, Anne Morris, and David Reischl.

Principal accomplishment of the class of '38, however, was the Senior Ball, the decorations of which transformed the gymnasium into the lania of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel.



The kyak can hold only one person, while some of the larger umiaks are able to accommodate as many as fifty persons.


## Student Frolic


## ORGANIZATIONS

Dutch replied, "Yeah, some of the keys are in the wrong place."



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


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
