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### Dedication

Eight years ago a rangy Westerner took over the science laboratory in Juneau High School. The years since that day have seen this soft-spoken man—Mr. Gil Eide by name—grow into an integral part of our school, exerting an ever-widening influence on successive generations of the youth of Juneau.

When former students, home from college or the armed services, return for a visit to the scenes of their high school days, Mr. Eide's lab is one of their first points of call, so confident are they of his continuing interest and friendship.

Mr. Eide's skill as a teacher is attested by the fact that although science is regarded as one of the more difficult subjects in the curriculum, he is able to steer his classes over mental hurdles with the minimum of tedium and the maximum of benefit and interest. Passers-by in the hall frequently catch inviting glimpses of a darkened classroom and a movie camera reeling out a lesson more graphic and clear-cut than any number of words and books could create. Experiments with electricity, or human balance, or dissection sometimes result in such a gay burst of merriment or excited comment that listening ears in more prosaic classrooms tingle with envy and curiosity. For most, Mr. Eide's classes are a vivid and never-to-be-forgotten experience; for all, there remains the satisfying knowledge that the study of science has resulted in perceptions sharpened, horizons extended, and interests broadened.

A familiar figure at school events is Mr. Eide with his camera and flash bulbs. Results of his skill as a photographer always appear the following day on the bulletin board by the door of the science lab, and there interested groups of students cluster, eager to see themselves and their friends in Mr. Eide's photographs of school activities.

One of Mr. Eide's most valued contributions to the life of our school is his direction of the Rifle Club which he has served as adviser for the last three years. Long a popular activity, the Rifle Club under Mr. Eide's leadership ranks as one of the foremost organizations of the extra-curricular program.

For these and other reasons the 1951 TOTEM is affectionately dedicated to Mr. Gil Eide.


#### MESSAGE


It is the belief of the TOTEM staff that you will bear with us in generosity wherein we may have fallen short of our goal or blundered in the execution of our purpose.

#### YOUR PART OF TOMORROW

The members of any and all graduating classes inevitably find themselves face to face with the problem of what to do after graduation. Many of you have already made that decision. Many of you are still putting it off, perhaps because you may feel that it has already been made for you in that the state of world affairs is now such that our government has decreed that the best of you shall serve your country for a time soon after graduation. Rather than being bitter and discouraged you might better be even more determined in your effort to attain those goals which you have set or may set for yourself. Every youth, as he sets forth in the world upon his own feet, is appalled at the apparent tempest about him, particularly, in these years of World Wars I and II and the threat of World War III. Yet each generation of the past has faced this same problem. Consider the following quotation taken from Harper's Weekly dated OCTOBER 10, 1857.

"It is a gloomy moment in history. People are filled with grave and deep apprehension; never has the future seemed so incalculable. In our own country there is apprehension and panic. In France the political cauldron boils and seethes with uncertainty; Russia hangs like a cloud, dark and silent upon the horizon of Europe; while all the energies, resources and influence of the British Empire are sorely tried, and are yet to be tried more sorely in coping with the vast and deadly disturbed relations in China. Of our own troubles no one can see the end."

The youth of past generations have faced their world, national, and individual problems and have prospered. You of the present younger generation will without doubt do the same. Your purpose could well be to see that each of you make such contribution as will enable you to say that you, individually and collectively, are a part of the ANSWER to the world problem itself. Success will more and more be determined by intelligent effort. Every field of endeavor demands more education, more training. Fifty years ago American Secondary Schools were enrolling only one out of every ten boys and girls of high school age. Today 4 out of every 5 of this same age group are enrolled in grades 9 through 12. College enrollments are swelled to full capacity. People who find prosperity just around the corner—usually know which corner to turn.

Michael Pupin came from the Balkans in 1876 as a poor and ignorant immigrant boy. By hard work and application he became one of the outstanding inventors of the century. Without some of his inventions we would consider life impossible today. And so we may go on recalling names without number of people who have carved for themselves important places in human development.

Your Board of Education, as well as your staff, join me in saying, "Study to improve yourselves that your families may be proud of you. Study to improve yourselves that you may discover new things, and thereby benefit the race. Study to improve yourselves that your country may be proud of you.
